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

May Is National Melanoma Awareness Month



SIGNS OF MELANOMA

Melanoma can appear suddenly—as a new mole—or it can grow slowly, in or near an existing mole.

- *In men*, melanomas are often found between the shoulders and hips, or the head and neck area.
- *In women*, melanoma often develops on the lower legs as well as between the shoulders and hips.



But melanoma can appear anywhere. Get to know the pattern of moles, spots, freckles, and other marks on your skin. Then do monthly skin self-examinations to track changes in these markings. Also be sure to see a dermatologist once a year for a mole check.






- 1- A growth that increases in size and looks pearly, translucent, tan, brown, black, red, pink, or multicolored
- 2- A mole that changes in color or in texture, takes on an uneven shape, gets larger, or is bigger than a pencil eraser
- 3- A spot or growth that continues to itch, hurt, crust, scab, fade, or bleed
- 4- An open sore that lasts for more than 4 weeks, or heals and then reopens
- 5- A scaly or crusty bump that is dry, rough, and pointed (sticks out like a horn) and may sometimes cause a pricking or tender feeling in the skin



ABCDE RULE — THE WARNING SIGNS OF MELANOMA



A is for asymmetry. One half of the mole does not match the other half.

B is for border irregularity. The edges are ragged, notched, or blurred.

C is for color. The pigmentation is not uniform, with variable degrees of tan, brown, or black.

D is for diameter greater than 6 millimeters. Although, in recent years more melanomas are being diagnosed between 3 and 6 millimeters. Any sudden or progressive increase in size should be of concern.

E is for evolution. Any mole than changes its shape, thickness or appearance should be evaluated.

WHAT CAUSES MELANOMA?

- Exposure to ultraviolet radiation. Blistering sunburns at any time of life. Intense sun exposure, every now and then.
- Your genes A personal or family history of melanoma.
- Xeroderma pigmentosum, a skin disease.

SPECIAL RISK FACTORS

You are at special risk if you answer "Yes" to any of these questions:

- Has anyone in your family ever had melanoma?
- Do you now have, or have you ever had, non-cancerous, but unusual lookingmoles?
- Have you been diagnosed with melanoma in the past?
- Are you taking anymedications that might weaken your immune?
- Do you have more than 50 ordinary moles?
- Did you have one or more severe, blistering sunburns as a child or teenager?
- Do you have manyfreckles?
- Do you have fair skin and light eyes?
- Do you frequently spend time in the sun between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. without skin protection?

MELANOMA IS CUREABLE



Treatments for melanoma range from radiation therapy to medications to surgery. Early treatment ensures the best chance of a full recovery.
